A Message From The Pastor

2018 is here! As we enter a new year we step into new territory, going where we have never gone before; facing adventures and challenges we have never faced before. But as we embark on the new, we carry with us the knowledge, and sometimes pain and scars, from where we have been. I find myself remembering my own woundedness from past journeys: my failings and fears; shackles of my shame; and the painful awareness of sins of my life. But with these things we carry with us we enter into the "Land of 2018" with the assurance that a King who chose to "move into our neighborhood" and become flesh as John's Gospel says. That King in commoner's clothes bears us in his arms. Lee Eclov says this very well. I'll let him tell you. Read on....

There is a vivid picture of Christ's sacrifice for sin in Mark Twain's novel, A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court. The story tells the adventures of an ordinary man (the Connecticut Yankee) from the 19th century, who is transported back to the medieval world of King Arthur. At one point he convinces King Arthur to dress like a peasant and take a journey through his kingdom. The results are generally laughable as the king, completely oblivious to life in the trenches, tries to carry on with all the pomp of the court while those around him simply think he is crazy. But there is a touching chapter titled "The Smallpox Hut" describing how the king and his companion happen upon a beggar's hovel. The husband lies dead, and the wife tries to warn them away:

"For the fear of God, who visits with misery and death such as be harmless, tarry not here, but fly! This place is under his curse."

The king replies, "Let me come in and help you. You are sick and in trouble."

The woman asks the king to go into the loft and check on their child.

"It was a desperate place for him to be in, and might cost him his life," observes the Yankee, "but it was no use to argue with him."

The king disappears up a ladder looking for the girl.

There was a slight noise from the direction of the dim corner where the ladder was. It was the king descending. I could see that he was bearing something in one arm, and assisting himself with the other. He came forward into the light; upon his breast lay a slender girl of 15. She was but half conscious; she was dying of smallpox. Here was heroism at its last and loftiest possibility, its utmost summit; this was challenging death in the open field unarmed, with all the odds against the challenger, no reward set upon the contest, and no admiring world in silks and cloth-of-gold to gaze and applaud; and yet the king's bearing was as serenely brave as it had always been in those cheaper contests where knight meets knight in equal fight and clothed in protecting steel. He was great now; sublimely great. The rude statues of his ancestors in his palace should have an addition. I would see to that; and it would not be a mailed king killing a giant or a dragon, like the rest. It would be a king in commoner's garb bearing death in his arms.

There is Jesus on the cross! A king in commoner's garb bearing sinners in his arms.

VISION TEAM UPDATE

"For Such a Time as This..."

In the book of Esther, she is told by her uncle Mordecai:

"If you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise from a different place...And who knows but that you have come to your position for such a time as this, Fishers UMC is in a unique position to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with our community. And who is our community? Who are we, today?

The Vision Team has been working hard to answer those questions. Using objective and subjective data, gathered from interviews with church members, Hamilton County demographic reports, and their own, diverse experiences, the Team has gathered information about our current context that will help shape how we do ministry going forward. The following is a snapshot of our county and church in 2017:



HAMILTON COUNTY

Fishers named "#1 Best Place to Live" in America according to Money Magazine

Hamilton County is becoming an increasingly diverse community - ethnically, religiously, and socio-economically

The population of Fishers has grown from 20,500 in 1995 to over 90,000 today

More than four out of five residents are under 55 years of age, with the average age being 34 years old

The importance of faith for the average resident is lower than the state average, coupled with a culture of "busyness" in work, play, sports, school, etc.

Household incomes are above state average, so too is the risk for foreclosures



OUR CHURCH

In a changing community, Fishers UMC has deep, stable roots

We did not have an intentional, disciple-making plan (called a Discipleship Pathway) to shepherd persons from non-believers to fully-devoted disciples of Jesus Christ [The good news is that thanks to the Vision Team, a Discipleship Pathway has been identified and a Ministry Team has been created. More details to come next month about this exciting work!]

While the community has grown steadily, our church's average worship attendance has plateaued

The 11:00 hour possesses the greatest potential for growth - in worship, youth and children's ministries, and Sunday School opportunities.

The above information contains some of the highlights from the Vision Team's research. While much data has been gathered and many insights learned, the strongest takeaway has been that for such a time as this our church is positioned to make a strategic jump to innovate our tradition rich history in ways that will share the Good News of Jesus with more and more people in our community. Next month, we will share more about the Core Values that will shape how we do ministry here at Fishers UMC.

UNITED METHODIST MEN





The research is showing approaches with clear benefit to end of life experiences. All adults of the congregation--men and women--are invited to participate.

Dr. Maiko, an elder of the Indiana Conference and participant in Fishers UMC activities, is lead researcher for the project which is being conducted under the auspices of IU Health's Daniel F. Evans Center for Spiritual

and Religious Values in Healthcare. The program includes tips and techniques for professionals, family, and friends to improve the end of life experience for loved ones when dealing with difficult diagnoses, making decisions, improving mental state and other aspects of this stressful time. This is truly a program for adults of all ages.
